

### COLLEGIATE 4-H CLUBS

Two additional college 4-H clubs were organized during 1967, one at Appalachian State Teachers College, Boone, North Carolina, and another at East Carolina University, Greenville, North Carolina. Extension personnel assumed the leadership role in establishing these clubs in cooperation with the college administrators. An Extension agent in Watauga County and a faculty member serve as advisor to the ASTC club. The club at ECU is supervised by Linda Humphrey, Assistant Home Economics Agent in Pitt County.

Other college clubs are located at NCSU, Raleigh; UNC-G, Greensboro; Pembroke College, Pembroke; and Campbell College at Buies Creek, North Carolina. Six college clubs are now functioning in North Carolina.

4-H Clubs on college campuses provide opportunities for club members to:

- Continue active membership in 4-H
- Attend educational programs of special interest
- Keep in touch with the latest developments in 4-H on a county, district, state, and national level
- Compete in the state awards program until their 19th birthday
- Make new friends from across the state

Special activities this year included:

1. Intercollegiate exchange party between the NCSU and UNC-G 4-H Clubs
2. N. C. State Club sponsored a checking booth for wraps and packages at the State Fair. A sizeable profit was realized for their treasure. Girls from the UNC-G Club assisted one day with this project.
3. Observance of 4-H Church Sunday and National 4-H Week

Being of service to the community has become one of the goals for college 4-H Clubs. Members of the various clubs provided leadership in helping with the local county programs where college clubs are located. Several club members in the N. C. State University club assisted Wake County in the training of County Council officers and served as judges at County 4-H Demonstration Day. UNC-G 4-H members served as ushers for the Guilford County 4-H Achievement Program, appeared on the program, and one member modeled clothes at a clothing training school. They also conducted a joint program with the N. C. State club of making Christmas favors and singing of Christmas carols for the patients at the Guilford County Orthopedic Center. A special project conducted by the N. C. State University club was the teaching of a monthly class on courtesy and manners to prison inmates at the Pre-Release Center in Raleigh.

Thirty delegates from North Carolina attended the "Collegiate 4-H Weekend" Conference January 25 and 26 at Rock Eagle 4-H Center for College 4-H Club members from Georgia, Alabama, Florida, South Carolina, and North Carolina. The North Carolina delegation was responsible for the educational program on Saturday. It consisted for a talk by Captain Thomas Joseph Brereton on the situation in Vietnam, a film presentation on sex problems of young people, and a group discussion on the film led by Dr. Karl King, Family Life Specialist from the University of Georgia.
