

STATE CLUB SHORT COURSE.

Our State Short Course was almost a failure from the point of attendance. On the other hand those who did attend received some very valuable instructions of a practical nature.

There were several things to cause the poor attendance. First the announcement of the date of the short course was not made in time; second, the agents were urged to get farmers to the Farmers' Convention, which came prior to the Boys Short Course, making it impossible for the agent to round up the boys; third, the shortage of labor on the farm prevented many from attending and the fact that those under fourteen were debarred from attending kept the attendance from running up as in previous years.

A very practical course in rope work, belt lacing, gas engine operation, farm levels and stock judging was given. Some very good work in leadership was done also at the general meetings. State officers were elected and committees of boys were appointed to take an active part in the meeting next year.
